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Many of these books came from the library of Dr. Clarence B. Farrar [1874-1970]. Farrar "trained under several of the foremost medical scholars of his era beginning with Osler and then at Heidelberg under Kraepelin, Nissl, and Alzheimer. Farrar was hand-picked by Prof. Charles Clarke, the University [of Toronto's] inaugural head of Psychiatry, to succeed him in both that chair and as the first Director of the Toronto Psychiatric Hospital (TPH) opening in 1925. Farrar served in those capacities until 1947, setting the stage for the TPH to continue as the Department's clinical, teaching, research and administrative nexus until succeeded in 1966 by the Clarke Institute." Dr. Farrar also served as the editor of the American Journal of Psychiatry for 34 years. (TPH: History and Memories of Toronto Psychiatric Hospital by Edward Shorter).

4. ANTIKAMNIA CHEMICAL CO. The Antikamnia Calendar for 1898. Copyright the Antikamnia Chemical Co. St. Louis, MO. U.S.A. Approx. 7" x 10", consisting of six chromolithographs depicting caricatures of skeletons dressed as woman on a bike, a hobo, etc., printed on the recto of stiff card, with printed advertisements for products offered by the Antikamnia Chemical Co. on the versos. Light dampstaining to the edges of the final card, but this is an about fine example. *These macabre illustrations were the work of Dr. Louis Crusius [1862-1898]. Crusius, a native of Sauk City, Wisconsin, worked as a printer's apprentice in the newspaper*

office of his father, and then moved to Texas where he worked in a drugstore owned by his uncle. After moving to St. Louis, he attended the St. Louis College of Pharmacy. He became part owner of a pharmacy in St. Louis and began to display his watercolour sketches in the window of the shop. In 1890, he graduated from the St. Louis College of Physicians and Surgeons and became a lecturer and professor of histology at the Marion Sims Medical College. He continued to produce his whimsical illustrations, and in 1893 he published *The Funny Bone* "a compilation of jokes and 150 cuts from his comic drawings." Many of his illustrations were sold and used by various companies to advertise their products, the most notable were the 30 illustrations purchased by the Antikamnia Chemical Company for the *Antikamnia Calendars* (1897-1901) who used the skeletons to promote their pain and fever reducing tablets. **Cover image is an edited detail from this item.**

Rothschild 56, Osler 4335. *John Armstrong [1709-1799] Scottish physician who published several essays and poems. This work is divided into four parts; Book I—Air; Book II—Diet; Book III—Exercise and Book IV—Passions. This work established Armstrong's reputation as a writer. "Warton praises it for classical correctness; Dr. Beattie predicted that it would 'make him known and esteemed by posterity...' " Warton stated, "To describe so difficult a thing, gracefully and poetically, as the effects of distemper on a human body, was reserved for Dr. Armstrong, who accordingly hath executed it at the end of his third book of The Art of Preserving Health, where he hath given us that pathetic account of the sweating sickness. There is a classical correctness and closeness of style in this poem that are truly admirable, and the subject is raised and adorned by numberless poetical images." (Allibone). See page 11.* \$850
6. ASCHAFFENBURG, Gustav (editor). *Handbuch der Psychiatrie*. Allgemeiner Teil, Abt. I-V (WITH); Spezieller Teil, Abt. I-VII. (all published). Leipzig and Wein: Franz Deuticke, 1911-1929. First editions. In twenty-two volumes. (The first part 'Allgemeiner Teil' I-IV in eight volumes; "Spezieller Teil" in fourteen volumes.) From the library of Dr. C. B. Farrar with his bookplate in each volume. There is a 1p TLS from Aschaffenburg to Farrar laid in. The letter dated "September 16, 42" consists of two paragraphs in which he thanks Farrar "for your kind letters." He apologizes for his poor English explains how this has affected his work. He expresses his "hope that I will be able to afford and to arrange to assist the meeting in Detroit, perhaps even deliver a lecture too..." Signed "Yours sincerely" with a signature in full. (WITH): TLs from Kurt Schneider to Farrar dated "14.1.55" in German, in which he thanks Farrar for sending two offprints."

Schneider was one of the contributors to the Handbuch and was later the Director of the Klinik at Heidelberg. Tall 8vo., orig. green cloth lettered in black, volumes paginated individually. Fine. Garrison & Morton 4957. *Gustave Aschaffenburg [1866-1944], German psychiatrist, was a pioneer in the field of criminology and the founder of forensic psychiatry. He studied with Kraepelin and Alzheimer at the University of Heidelberg, and after receiving his medical degree in 1890, he became the resident physician at Kraepelin's Heidelberg clinic. Aschaffenburg then accepted the directorship of the Institution for the Criminally Insane at Halle and was also professor of psychiatry at the University of Cologne. When the Nazis took power in the 1930s, Aschaffenburg was dismissed because of his Jewish ancestry, and in 1938 he emigrated to the United States, where he was a professor at both the Catholic University of America and Johns Hopkins. He published more than 250 works, "his great contemporary and lasting historical significance lies in the field of forensic psychiatry." His 1903 publication Das Verbrechen und seine Bekämpfung is a systematic study on the causes of crime in which he discusses "individual-heredity and social-environmental facts" and dismisses Lombroso's idea of the "born criminal." Aschaffenburg's Handbuch der Psychiatrie is a "monumental work of the first magnitude, doing honor to its editor as well as the distinguished contributors."* (AJP v.101.3.p.427). Farrar with his name, and his notes in pen on the rear e/paper. 8vo., orig. beige cloth stamped in red, with the red cross symbol in a white circular background on the upper board, viii, 199pp. A fine, bright copy. *Farrar's notes at the rear document the conflict between Barton and the medical profession, relating remarks made by Osler at a meeting in Baltimore which was an attempt to reconcile the existing difficulties. According to Farrar, Osler stated that "so long as Barton remained at the head of the Red Cross, no effective policy of cooperation could be established."* *A contemporary review in the Chicago Tribune paints a rather different picture of the author, noting that "Miss Barton writes in a simple, graphic style that makes her pictures of the disasters she witnessed a lurid background for the work of relief she directed. The Red Cross is her memorial, but this book will bring the public into personal touch with this gentle old lady."* **See page 11.** \$600

From the library of Dr. C. B. Farrar with his signature and bookplate. Tall 8vo., orig. cloth, xx, 198pp. A fine, bright copy. *George Miller Beard [1839–1883], physician. "His initial essay in medical literature, to which he soon became a ceaseless contributor, was a paper on 'Electricity as a Tonic' (1866). In that year, he associated himself with Dr. A. D. Rockwell of New York, with whom, as with a kindred spirit, he conducted researches in electro-therapeutics for a series of years, the results of which were embodied in articles on the Medical Use of Electricity and later, in 1871, in The Medical and Surgical Uses of Electricity. This latter work was translated into German, had a wide vogue in Europe, and at once gave Beard an international reputation as an investigator. He introduced and popularized the terms 'central galvanization' and 'general faradization' and gained for them universal acceptance. In 1868, he became a lecturer on nervous diseases in New York University and later physician to the Demilt Dispensary in the department of electro-therapeutics and nervous diseases. He was several times a delegate to foreign scientific associations, and in 1881 a delegate to the International Medical Congress in London. In neurology, he was an American pioneer and made a notable contribution to the study of 'neurasthenia,' being the first to show clearly and positively that Americans possess a peculiar nervous organization. He*

maintained that the cause of the greater prevalence of nervous diseases in the United States is dryness of the air and extremes of heat and cold. In psychiatry, he was an early champion of reforms, many of which, through his initiative and zeal, became incorporated in subsequent practice, and he was one of the originators of the 'National Association for the Protection of the Insane and the Prevention of Insanity.'" "This work, the result of many years spent on a comparative study of the structure of vertebrates, is a compendium of previous writings on the subject, with some original observations of Blaes. It is the first general systematic treatise on comparative anatomy."* (G&M) *"Blaes anticipated Cowper in finding the Cowper's glands which he illustrated in his plate of the genitalia and os penis of the rat"* (Norman). **See page 12.** \$2,500

Brinkerhoff practiced in Upper Sandusky, Ohio, but was considered by most of the medical community to be both a nuisance and a quack. This elusive volume bears witness to some of his beliefs. G&M 1751 citing the first edition (Paris, 1895). *Brouardel [1837–1906] was a leading authority of French forensic medicine, and a passionate advocate of issues relating to public health and hygiene, such as tuberculosis, venereal disease, alcoholism and child abuse. The above work is divided into two parts, the first addresses the "Phenomena of Death", including the moment of death, uncertainty of the signs of death, rigor mortis, putrefaction, cremation and mummification. The second part "consists of what may be styled clinical lectures on the various forms of sudden death, particularly bearing on those aspects which have a legal or practical bearing."* \$250

Someone has replicated the autograph-style font and written in ink on the first page of text "All life (on earth) is breath All else (on earth) is death", name, top corner of upper wrapper chipped, otherwise about near fine. *On the dangers of mouth-breathing, by the American painter known for his depiction of Native Americans in the Old West. Catlin observes the health and strength of Native North Americans and attributes the ill-health of Europeans to the habit of mouth-breathing while asleep. Later published as Shut Your Mouth and Save Your Life.* \$200

17. (COMMITTEE FOR MENTAL HYGIENE). *Mental Hygiene Bulletin*. New York: Published by the Committee for Mental Hygiene, January, 1923-December 1932. Vol.1, No.1 through Vol.X, Nos.9 and 10 (all published). 4to., issues bound in plain brown cloth, the pagination varies with the shortest bulletins (usually early) being 2pp. and the longest 20pp., with the average length 8-12pp. Fine. *The Mental Hygiene Bulletin began as an offshoot of the publication Mental Hygiene when it became apparent that there was a "need for a more frequent publication through which those interested in various aspects of mental hygiene could be kept informed of events as they take place."* "Devoted to a narration and discussion of significant current events in mental health" the bulletin was issued monthly (except for July and August) by the National Committee for Hygiene. The first eight volumes (1923 through the end of 1930) were edited by Frankwood Williams, an American psychiatrist who worked with the National Committee for Mental Hygiene from 1916 to 1931, serving as medical director from 1923-193). Through an advocate for the science of psychiatry as a prevention of mental illness, Williams hoped to reduce the number of cases of mental illness reported. He focused on social issues such as alcoholism and criminality; taking part in a survey of prisons in the county of New York which showed that "a significant percentage of individuals confined in them suffered from mental illness." (*Am. Journal of Public Health*, April 2007) Williams worked for the development of clinics for the treatment of juvenile delinquents and to prevent these problems, intervention strategies that targeted early childhood. In addition to editing the bulletin, Williams' major publication was *Finding a Way in Mental Hygiene*. The last two volumes were edited by Paul Komora, who worked with the Committee from 1914 to 1944. The content reflects the work of the National Committee for Hygiene and those associated with it including Williams, Clarence Hincks, and William Welch, as well as other psychiatrists, doctors, sociologists and social workers with an interest in mental hygiene, especially as it relates to juvenile delinquency and criminality. There are short, subject-based articles, as well as bulletin style reports, information on conferences and recent publications. \$1,500

59. VAN DE VELDE, Th. H. (Theodoor Henrik). Sex Efficiency Through Exercises Special Physical Culture For Women. With 480 Cinematographic and 54 Full-Page Illustrations. London: William Heinemann (Medical Books) Ltd., 1933. First edition. Tall 8vo., orig. blue cloth lettered in gilt, (xviii), (1)-163, (164 blank). With 54 black and white plates. With a Cinematographic Supplement consisting of 12 "flicker films" which are comprised of 40 black and white photographic reproductions printed on stiff card. When the outer edge is flicked with the thumb,

it gives the illusion of a moving picture, each depicting a woman demonstrating one of the exercises. There are two tears to the page separating the first set of 6 “cinematographs” from the second, which have been repaired with tape, but otherwise this is a fine copy of an interesting and uncommon book. *Theodor van de Velde [1873-1937] Dutch physician and gynaecologist, served as director of the Gynaecological Institute in Haarlem. His 1926 publication, Het Volkomen Huwelijk, published in English as Ideal Marriage: Its Physiology and Technique, gained him international notoriety. In this work on sexuality, Van de Velde argued that the “critical goal of marriage consists of sexual pleasure shared by husband and wife” and sought the “cultivation of the technique of eroticism as an art in marriage.” The book went through multiple printings in several countries, becoming one of the best-known works on this subject—it was also placed on the Index Librorum Prohibitorum by the Roman Catholic Church. Van de Velde’s other works, Sex Hostility in Marriage and Fertility and Sterility in Marriage were both published in English in 1931. The above title builds on his previous work, and aims to provide “a guide for women and those who help them (whether as doctors, midwives, nurses and gymnastic instructresses) in the full evolution and utilization of the feminine sexual capacities and faculties. These capacities and faculties are generally quite inadequate in practice; they should include both appropriately active participation in the act of sexual congress and appropriate voluntary muscular action that assists the act of birth.” In consultation and collaboration with a gymnastic instructor, Van de Velde has created a system of exercises to achieve the desired results for women, both before and after pregnancy. He notes that while his previous work “Ideal Marriage taught men the technique of physical love, so I hope that this book will give women the key to complete erotic stimulation.” See inner rear cover.*

Fine. *Hans Wurtz [1875-1958] controversial and influential theorist in the field of physical disabilities. He insisted that the psychology of the physically disabled is formed from the central issue of their disability. “Proceeding from undoubtedly humanitarian intentions, Wurtz’s ‘cripple pedagogy’ ultimately provided a further rationale for segregating disabled people and contributed to the stigmatization of people with orthopedic impairments.” Wurtz was the education director at the Oskar-Helene Home and the co-editor of Zeitschrift fur Kruppelfursorge a journal about care for the physically disabled. The above work is profusely illustrated with photographs of amputees and others with physical disabilities who lived in homes for the disabled. There are pictures of group learning environments as well as individuals performing a variety of everyday tasks such as sewing and writing. See inner rear cover.*


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
